# "Australian Aborigines Sign Language [asw] (A language of Australia)

- Location: Widespread. Southern Australia, central, and west desert regions, coastal Arnhem Land; north coast islands, Torres Strait islands, west side of Cape York peninsula.
- Language Status: 6a (Vigorous).
- **Dialects:** None known. May be a collection of several distinct languages; survey needed. Not related to Australian Sign Language [asf].
- Language Use: Used by hearing Aborigines as alternate form of communication with speakers of other languages. Other non-deaf sign languages used by some groups, such as Aranda, Warlpiri, Warumungu, during periods of mourning or hunting. Several such alternate sign languages are also used by deaf persons."
