- **Population:** 8,000–40,000 deaf persons (Van Cleve 1986).

- **Dialects:** None known. Related to American Sign Language [ase].
- Language Use: Signs introduced in 1907 by Catholic nuns. Some home signs also used.
- Other Comments: Although some form of PRSL may still be used in the lower populated areas in the western and central parts of the country, it appears that ASL [ase] is becoming the sole sign language of the Puerto Rican deaf community."
